I mashed and brewed from 104 bushels, which gave a gravity of 1,231 ibs., or 11‡ per bushel; and from the same quantity of maltiment the gravity was 1,183 lbs. or 11‡ lbs. per bushel, making a difference in favour of the Convalier Barley sent by Hon. Mr. Brown, of 48 lbs., or 4 per cent.

Statement:—Germination on malt floor from 750 grains of Mr. Brown's Barley—741 did not sprout—9.

750 grains 6-rowed—736 did not sprout—14.
